GV Charter School first-graders learn about water

Water Efficiency Technician Kaycee Margherita shares details about a special day at Orchard Springs: The students had camped out at Orchard Springs the night before and woke up to hands-on learning stations put together by several NID departments. The students are currently learning about the water cycle, mapping, and tools in the classroom, so Water Efficiency, Survey, and Backflow teamed up to bring those lessons to life.

At the Water Efficiency station, we talked about the water cycle and water conservation. Students created their own mini water cycles using cups, warm water, and ice to see how water changes and moves through the water cycle. The excitement was contagious when each student was able to create their very own "rain!" We then challenged the students to think of ways they could save their raindrop once it made its way to their home.

The Survey Department, Carl Cookson and Corey Schmitt, brought out an older drone and survey equipment so students could see some of the tools used when working with maps and gathering information.

The Backflow team, Matt Halvorson, Robby Graham, Bobby Newkirk and Troy Gomes, brought the fun with tools from their trucks, including giant wrenches, blowers, and water valves. Students even had the opportunity to use the equipment to turn water on and off and see how it works. Jim Belleque from our Electrical Department also brought the mini pump they have created, allowing students to experiment with different speeds and watch water being pumped through a mini system.

Overall, it was a great morning! The students were engaged and excited at every station and got to see firsthand how what they are learning in the classroom connects to the work our departments do every day. The students finished their day with a nature walk around the campground and down to the water, making for a perfect ending to a fun day of hands-on learning!

One key requirement: letters of support from the community, including NID employees.

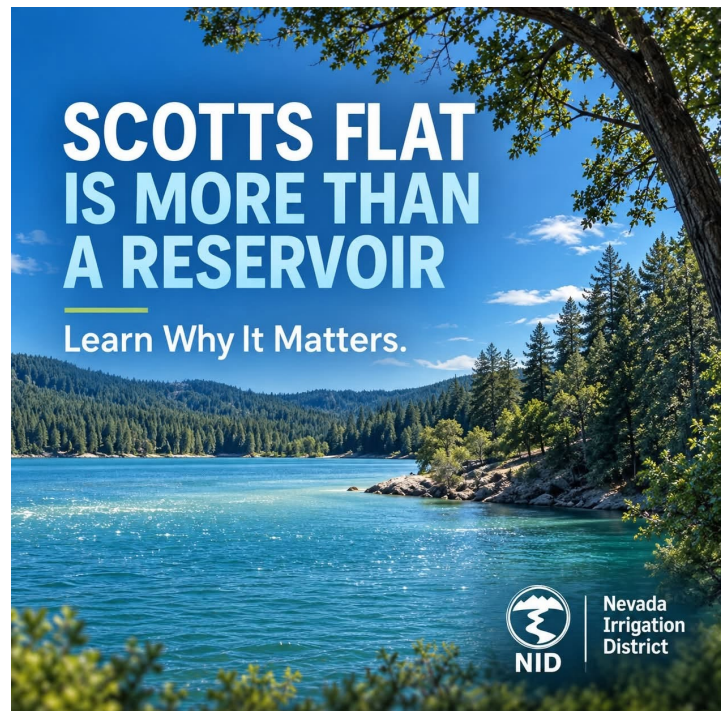
Why It Matters

Originally built in 1949 and later modified and raised in 1964, the Scotts Flat spillway has significant structural issues worsened by past storm events. Both the Division of Safety of Dams (DSOD) and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) have determined it must be replaced. Completing this project protects the reservoir, downstream communities, and the raw water system that serves thousands of customers. By submitting a letter of support, you help demonstrate broad regional backing for this important project. The more voices we include, the stronger our application becomes.

Farmers and Ranchers Join NID's New Water Efficiency Committee

NID's new Agricultural Water Efficiency Stakeholder Committee continued its momentum on Sept. 22, holding a well-attended second meeting with growers, ranchers, community stakeholders and two NID Board directors. The discussion focused on practical ways to use water more efficiently while supporting on-farm and ranch productivity throughout the foothills.

The committee reviewed early goals, shared on-the-ground challenges and identified several opportunities where collaboration can make a real difference. Members highlighted grant opportunities, data needs and stronger coordination with agricultural water users as key priorities for the months ahead. Meetings will continue every three weeks through the fall.

A highlight was the committee's support for a new water-use survey from the University of California Cooperative Extension. The survey aims to better understand how irrigation water is used, the crops it supports and the economic and ecological role of irrigated agriculture in Placer and Nevada counties. It is being sent to raw-water customers of NID, the Placer County Water Agency, South Sutter Water District and other producers across the region. All responses will remain confidential and anonymous.

This committee reflects NID's commitment to engaging directly with customers and supporting a resilient agricultural community. As one of the largest raw-water providers in the Sierra foothills, NID continues to prioritize reliable service and a healthy watershed.



Staying Safe as the Seasons Change

September brings cooler weather, new routines, and a chance to refresh our safety awareness. It's also National Preparedness Month—a reminder that small steps today can prevent big problems tomorrow.

Be Ready for Anything

Know the plan: Review our emergency procedures, evacuation routes, and assembly points. A fire breaks out at work – *where you going to go?*

Keep it clear: Hallways, stairs, and exits should always be free of clutter. In an emergency, a clear path can save lives.

Think ahead: Know where to find extinguishers, first-aid kits, and automated external defibrillators AEDs. *Quick – where's the nearest fire extinguisher near your desk or locker?*

Tidy spaces = safer spaces. Don't let paper or combustibles pile up.

Check cords and plugs. If it's frayed or overloaded, it's unsafe.

Handle heaters wisely. Keep them stable, away from flammables, and always shut them off at the day's end.

Fight the Flu

Flu season kicks off in the fall, but you can help stop it in its tracks:

Get your shot. It's the best protection.

Wash up often. Soap, water, and at least 20 seconds.

NID Invests in Fire Hydrants

The district is working with local fire districts on efforts to improve fire protection through the placement and installation of new fire hydrants.

Under the new Community Investment Program, the district plans to install about a dozen new hydrants each year. This year's budget is \$60,000 and includes 15 new hydrants at several locations.

The program is being co-managed by Chief Engineer **Gary King** and Maintenance Manager **John Kirk** and is being conducted in coordination with fire districts, cities and counties.

Kirk said Nevada County and the City of Grass Valley are partnering with the district by waiving permit fees for the new hydrants. New hydrants are planned in the Nevada City area and in Placer County in years to come, Kirk noted.

Local fire officials are recommending locations for the new

hydrants and NID is working to accommodate requests when water supplies and necessary pressures are available to the area.

Smartsville First

In August, crews installed four new hydrants in Smartsville, Yuba County, where the district operates a tiny water treatment plant and system. Local firefight-

ers observed the work and expressed gratitude for the district's effort.

The district is using dry barrel hydrants, which are more reliable and require less maintenance than wet barrel models. In dry barrel hydrants, water remains underground at main line level, reducing the chance of freezing in cold weather.
